
Meaningful Evolutions and Transformations - Whats Next for Co-Design

Co-Design is a term that has drifted in and out of the mainstream since its inception in the 1970s, its various evolutions have come with new definitions, transformations, and applications. This has resulted in a multitude of approaches and sub-approaches that make up a diverse, complex, and often misunderstood term. Now introduce the complex, often confusing, and fast changing humanitarian sector and you have a "wicked" problem - oh and the energy access space, which is also a complex web of energy needs, wants, and aspirations.

Co-Design for Humanitarian Energy Systems and Services - what's that?

This jumble of sectors, definitions, terminology, and complex systems makes it challenging for humanitarian practitioners to first, engage with co-design practices, second, to ensure that this engagement is meaningful, and third, to benchmark their own practices against others to ensure a complete understanding of where practices can be improved - this is an issue.


Outsight International, funded by EnAccess Foundation, has developed the Humanitarian Energy Co-Design Toolbox to support humanitarian (energy) practitioners with these three core challenges. This toolbox collects, collates, and categorizes co-design theory and practice across the humanitarian project cycle (the Data Layer) - making it accessible to practitioners through a highly curated database with graphic format (the Presentation Layer) including case studies, workshop agenda, slides, and guidelines (the Training Pack). From decolonisation and localisation to data collection and analysis methods to many more, this toolbox represents the state of the art in Transformative Humanitarian Practice.



But what about Benchmarking Practice?

Our Co-Design Toolbox is built with an understanding that co-design practices evolve across a spectrum of approaches - see the co-design spectrum below - where the complexity, challenge of implementation, and ultimate meaningfulness increases from one side to the other. We have detailed what each level entails and a range of self reflective questions in our toolbox

documentation so that organizations can understand where their current projects sit within this spectrum. This means that when engaging with the training materials organizations can identify their own specific north star of practice to head towards.
